Why is faithfulness so hard? We speak words of faith with ease; they roll off the tongue in prayer and affirmation. And yet we fail to trust you, our God, with the actions of our lives. We confess that this is wrong. By your Holy Spirit and its gifts and fruits, train our hearts to beat and our hands to work for you. Mold us like clay that we would exhibit your kingdom to the world through the choices we make. Forgive us and renew us by the promise of the gospel. Make our faithfulness tangible in all we think, say, and do. In the name of Jesus we confess as much as we offer this prayer. Amen.

Today we ordain and install new Elders and Deacons at White Memorial. These servants are elected by our congregation, undergo a month of intensive training and have been welcomed by our Session, our governing board of elders. Please pray for these faithful souls as they serve our church over the next three years.

After the Reformation, composers and authors were busy creating settings of the psalms for use in congregational worship. This tune is attributed to Louis Bourgeois (c. 1510-1561) and was originally paired with a paraphrase of Psalm 118 (1545). The tune name comes from the first line of the paraphrase, "Rendez á Dieu lounge et gloire" (Give to God praise and glory).

Do you know the vision and value statement of White Memorial? White Memorial is a "Family of faith worshiping, embracing and serving in the manner of Christ. We are a family of faith where the gospel of Jesus Christ is proclaimed through vibrant worship, vital discipleship and dedicated service to neighbors near and far."

In worship we are called to bring our whole selves as an offering to God. This includes our failures, shortcomings, and sin. Confession rightly stands at the center of authentic Christian worship and is itself an affirmation that we trust in God's promise to forgive us through the ministry and work of our Savior.

The same tune as demonstrated in today's prelude was paired with a paraphrase of Psalm 98 in the 1562 Genevan Psalter. A 1970 revision of the metrical text in French was the inspiration for the English words created by clergyman and hymnologist Erik Routley. More than a translation, Routley's text for Hymn 371 stands as a unique creation, joyfully representing the post-Reformation ability of worshipers to lend their own voices in praise, while prior to that time they were primarily silent observers.

First and second graders have been learning the story of David and Goliath in Sunday school. *Goliath* tells the story in a musical, almost theatrical, setting and emphasizes the faith that David had in God.

We are in a period of speaking about stewardship, which is our shared generosity to support the work of the church. As we install new officers today, we have a visual witness to tangible faithfulness. How have we each demonstrated faithfulness in the past? How might God be calling us to demonstrate faithfulness in the future?

H. Isaac was a composer whose influence reached beyond his native Netherlands. He died in 1517, the year that Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the door of the church in Wittenberg. The offertory anthem is a brief excerpt from his monumental collection *Choralis Constantinus*, sacred choral works for the mass liturgy at Constance Cathedral (Konstanz, Germany).
