

# Journey to Bethlehem

Journeys may be long. Or they may be short. Either way, it has been said that every journey has three parts: beginning, middle, and end. Each is important. No journey is successful or complete, without all three parts completed.

The journey to Bethlehem is the most important journey ever taken. Joseph and Mary journey from north to south in ancient Israel to the hometown of their ancestors. They strike out because they are under orders of an immense scale.

The Roman Empire has ordered them (along with the ancient world) to be counted in a census. They are on the move because Rome and her Emperor has said "move."

As if Rome weren't powerful enough, Mary is also following the command of God who has charged her to give birth to the Messiah. All pregnancies move along something like a journey -- every baby and mother are on a journey together.

Under two sets of traveling orders, the journey to Bethlehem is not one of choice but of circumstance.

Long ago the holy family must have seemed like just another couple on their census hike -- so average on the outside that the Romans would have let them pass under their noses.

Advent is a journey and one we need to notice. First we journey with Joseph, and Mary, and Jesus. Once on the path, we realize they are not alone and so we note that we journey also with God. But the fullness of the Advent journey is realized when we admit that we are not passive observers on the road watching them plod by; not at all. The fullness is realized when we admit that we need Bethlehem as much as they do. We need hope to be born. We need the journey to end and end with a baby born and a star in the sky. We need a Messiah. Advent, which is like a beginning and a middle, needs its end.

Otherwise the journey cannot be completed. "Come Lord Jesus!," we say with the saints of light. Come, and let us journey together to Bethlehem. For Bethlehem is an end to our longings, and the beginning of our faith.

#### FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT



Bless sojourners and pilgrims who share this winding way; your hope burns through the terrors, your love sustains the day.

(Sylvia G. Dunstan; an excerpt from our opening response as we light the first candle of Advent)



Today we begin a new liturgical year. In the three-year cycle of the Revised Common Lectionary we return to Year A which features the gospel of Matthew.

There are many themes and ideas that represent Advent: prophecy of a Messiah to come, a people waiting in darkness, longing for salvation. While the world around us promotes the message that "Christmas" is already here, the church offers a counter view: Advent is a time of preparation and progression. We begin by lighting one candle; then two; then three... the light grows as our anticipation of fulfilled promises strengthens. We display one Advent banner today, *HOPE*, and will add another, then another; our appointments to the Sanctuary increase from week to week, starting with wreaths, then garlands, then poinsettia. These visual signs show us a progression on our Advent journey, a journey to Bethlehem. How can we arrive at our destination if there is no journey? Let us walk together this Advent. Walk with us in the worship on Sunday mornings, Wednesday evenings in the chapel, or other Advent services, events, and recognitions. Come with us as we journey to Bethlehem.

Listen for the word "hope" today. How does it resonate in each context it is spoken, sung, or prayed? What other words shared communicate hope? How might a renewed sense of hope guide and direct your life today and this week?

Our opening hymn, *Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus*, refers to Jesus' birth (born to set thy people free) and to his second coming (raise us to thy glorious throne). This later eschatological view of Christ coming again is described in today's gospel lesson from Matthew. The tune of *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel* is used for our communion response "... at table we taste bread and wine..." and serves as a Memorial Acclamation. Celebrating the sacrament, the redeeming work of the table, this First Sunday of Advent is in a word, hope.







#### SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

# Peace



Our Prelude picks up where we left off at the end of Advent 1, using another setting of *Nun Komm, der Heiden Heiland t*o set the tone. As we call ourselves to worship, we remember the words of Psalm 72. It is a power-source for justice. Today, Advent 2, is traditionally focused upon peace. The Psalm serves as a reminder that where the justice of God is known, the peace of God is sure to follow. If Advent is about nothing else, it is about our commitment to give witness to the promised peace of Christ.

Confession of sin is hardly anyone's favorite part of authentic worship. There are many things we would rather do. In our tradition, confession is both individual and corporate. Meaning that we also confess on behalf of our community, our nation, or even our world. As Advent Two calls us to peace, we must take stock and confess the violence which frames far too many of our lives.

Today, we read Isaiah 11, one of the most beloved of all our Advent readings. It is known the world over for good reason. Christians believe that these words refer to Jesus even while they have many layers of meaning. As you listen today, note how the prophet lays promise upon promise upon promise. How great is the promise of God's Son: "the earth shall be as full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters that cover the sea."

In Matthew, John the Baptist was a fighter -- at least in a certain sense of the word. It may seem a strange pairing on this Sunday in which we focus upon peace, but it is a reminder that peace is always a struggle. Peace takes courage. Peace takes witness. In the New Testament, John's witness is second only to that of Jesus himself.





#### THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT





Advent 3 is a day to declare joy. Joy comes with the Savior. But joy also comes through a devotion to God. Psalm 146 is part of a larger body of praise Psalms which are uninhibited in their declarations of joy. Joy may come in many forms, but it is, according to Galatians 5:22, always a fruit of the Holy Spirit.

Drawing broadly on Isaiah 35, our confession today is about how we turn our backs on joy. Joy is a gift to be savored and celebrated. Advent is about claiming the gifts of God in the midst of a broken world and then keeping watch for those gifts to bear fruit. Joy in Advent comes in the promise of a new born child or of an expectant mother.

Isaiah 35 is a scripture for every person who has ever turned to God for blessings. Our verses today end with the promise: "everlasting joy shall be upon their heads, they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away." That is a promise upon which to root our faith and to strive for the joy which only God's gracious love can provide.

Matthew 11 is a seminal text for understanding the purpose of Jesus. Jesus was born to offer the gifts of grace and salvation but he was also born to declare the justice and mercy of God. As you listen to our text today, listen for the message that Jesus sends to John. It is one of both reversal and of joy. Advent points our faith in many directions. Today it is pointing us to the new creation which only God may provide.

Our affirmation is mainly about the Holy Spirit. The Spirit is the root of joy, and so the more we can understand how the Holy Spirit works for us -- and in us -- the more we might understand the source and power of joy. When Jesus is born on Christmas, joy breaks forth into the world. Remember the words of the angel on Christmas: "Do not be afraid — I bring you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord."





Advent 4 is about love. Not merely human love, but divine love. The love of Jesus is the love of restoration, which is why we begin with Psalm 80. The love of Jesus is the kind of love that risks life and limb for the sake of others. The fourth Sunday in Advent, nearly as much as Christmas itself, pushes us to consider the great risk God has taken on our behalf. Love so great it risks the helplessness of an infant. Love so great it challenges our assumptions about the limits of love and the majesty of the heart of God.

Drawing from Isaiah 7, our confession today is about the promise of signs and how we miss them. We miss them to our own detriment. God is always speaking but the question is, "are we listening?" Turning our gaze to Bethlehem more completely than before, we open our hearts for the sign of new life and the arrival of Jesus in our hearts and homes.

Our text from Matthew today is about Joseph and the trust he shows in the plan of God. Joseph's faith was certainly tested, but Joseph has faith enough to see the will of God to its end. Part of the love we celebrate at Christmas is rightly the love of God. Yet another part is the love of Mary -- the love of a mother to her child. But the love of Joseph, for his God and for his wife, should not be overlooked.

Our sermon today is about the light of love in the midst of darkness. Our world is so full of light, we forget about the power and wonder of darkness. While darkness can be a great teacher, it can also be suffocating. Into the darkness of despair love comes shining: such is the promise of Christmas. Wherever we find the love of God, we find the light of life.
