Each Sunday, we offer four opportunities for you to worship with us at White Memorial (8:00, 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary and 11:00 a.m. OnPoint@1704). While you will notice differences in music, location and worship leadership among our different services, what unites us in our worship is our scripture, liturgy and sermon. All services use the same Call to Worship, Prayer of Confession, readings from Scripture and Affirmation of Faith.

Much of our worship today remembers two mountaintop experiences from the Bible. In the Bible, powerful things happen in high places. As we begin our worship, can you think of one or two "mountaintop" moments which have shaped your faith?

One of the functions of the transfiguration of Jesus is to help the disciples realign their understanding of Jesus. God wants them to see Jesus in a new light. As we pray, think about the areas of life which need new visions. Think about places in our personal lives and in our world which need to be realigned to correspond more closely with God's vision.

Today's musical setting of Psalm 99, by Robert Wetzler, pairs a refrain with pointed psalm verses (a practice of psalm singing which uses a melodic formula for each verse: the place to change melody notes is indicated by marks or "points" written above the words). The pointed verses are sung by the choir.

Has the power of God ever struck you, or someone you know, with awe?

Hymn 11, which pairs an old hymn with a relatively new text, lists images and names for God as they are found in scripture.

The text of Jesus, Take Us to the *Mountain* is used in two different musical settings during worship today. First is a setting by Carl Schalk, sung by the Chancel Choir. Second is the last hymn in worship today, UNSER HERRSCHER.

God has called us to do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than ourselves. God has called us to look not to our own interests, but to the interests of others. We desire to share in the same mind that was in Christ Jesus: who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave in human likeness. Jesus humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death on a cross. God highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God.

We use this affirmation frequently. It is an ancient hymn which has been imbedded in the words of Philippians. Like our Matthew text for the day, it is about the power and wonder of Jesus.


