Sacred Spaces

It is hard to believe a month has passed since the Notre-Dame de Paris Cathedral caught fire. Soon after the fire started, people from all over the world shared photos and memories through social media to remember the times they visited "Our Lady of Paris." Like many who came before them, the sacred space of the cathedral changed their lives. Spaces matter. Christopher Edmonston will often say, "we are in the memory business," and he's right. Spaces are made sacred by the memories we make in them. The space that houses our congregation is full of memory.

Over the last several weeks, teachers and volunteers have packed classroom items in anticipation of the renovation of our Weekday School. On May 28, moving trucks arrived on campus, to empty the hallways and classrooms that make up our Weekday School in the Luther Building. While the opportunity to purge is welcomed, it is also a time of reflection and memory. Some items have remained seemingly untouched, shaping the lives and memories of children for four decades. From June 3 until the middle of August, flooring will be replaced, walls will be painted, bathrooms will be refreshed, and the school as we know it will be transformed before the next class is greeted in September. The utility work on Colonial Road and McDonald Lane was completed last Friday. The Luther renovation will only have mild effects on the congregation. Without the constant disruptions from Colonial and McDonald to the life of our church and our neighbors, progress on the construction will seem to slow down. We are under roof, new walls already enclose our new facility, and much of the visible progress will cease during the summer. However, the interior is another story entirely. What was an empty chasm is beginning to look like the place where we will worship, eat, and host concerts. Just beyond the protective fencing, the ground is settling to make way for new courtyards and playgrounds. Our campus is transforming. There have been dramatic changes over the last few months, but more significant changes are still to come.

We are on budget, and we work hard each day to save money where we can. You need to know that we will incur a large portion of our project cost this summer. We currently have just over \$5 million in the building fund, and we spend an average of \$700,000 per month on the new facility. The Luther renovation will cost an additional \$550,000. Based on our average spending and the renovation, we will have approximately \$2.5 million in the fund by the beginning of September. We anticipated this level of spending. It does not come as a surprise. However, I would encourage you to continue giving towards your capital pledge, starting with giving towards the pledge you have made, or consider making one if you have not done so already. All of this *new* is exciting. And there is much more to come than I can name here. We will have opportunities to celebrate together in the Fall. Then we will celebrate again in February when we move into the new building. Because of your vision and your commitment, White Memorial will continue as a sacred space for generations to come.

FIGS: Filling in Gaps

Formed in 1982 by a group of Wake County residents, health professionals, and area church leaders, FIGS fills gaps for Wake County residents needing help purchasing their prescription medications and medical supplies in crisis situations.

"My husband lost his job and with only my part-time work, we could not afford my medicine. I was so scared that I would get sicker. I was so grateful for FIGS because Alliance Medical Ministry was able to get my medicine for free during this crisis." — Teresa. Alliance Medical Ministry patient

When people receive their acute and chronic medications in a timely fashion, they don't have to rely on hospital emergency departments for crisis healthcare. FIGS collaborates with Wake County's Urban Ministry Crisis Support Center and Open Door Clinic, Alliance Medical Ministries, Dorcas Ministries, and participating pharmacies to identify recipients in need. In 2018, FIGS funded 28,473 prescriptions for uninsured or underinsured citizens. FIGS is highly efficient—90% of its funding goes directly to clients.

WMPC has two members serving on the FIGS Board of Directors: Bob Usry, President, and Sandy Hattaway, Assistant Treasurer. Many church members support FIGS financially and are past board members. For 2019, the WMPC Community Allocations Committee awarded FIGS a grant of \$10,000. A BRIEF HISTORY OF RELIGION IN RUSSIA

In the 10th century Prince Vladimir I, who was converted by missionaries from Byzantium, adopted Christianity as the official religion for Russia, and since then the Russian Orthodox church has been the country's dominant religious institution.

After the communists took power in 1917, religious institutions suffered. The church was forced to forfeit most of its property, and many monasteries shut down. The constitution of the former Soviet Union nominally guaranteed religious freedom, but religious activities were greatly constrained,

More open expression of Christian beliefs were permitted during World War II, but restrictions were reimposed when the war ended.

In the 1980s, policies allowed greater toleration for the open practice of religion. The subsequent dissolution of the Soviet Union made religious freedom a reality and revealed that large sections of the population had continued to practice a variety of faiths in secret. Indeed, Russian nationalists who emerged beginning in the 1990s identified the Russian Orthodox Church as a major element of Russian culture but the nonreligious still constituted more than onefourth of the population. Muslims constitute Russia's second largest religious group.

Other Christian denominations are much smaller and include Baptist and Evangelical groups, which grew somewhat in membership during the 20th century.

In 1997 legislation was enacted that constrained denominations outside the five "traditional" religions— Russian Orthodoxy, several other Christian denominations, Islam, Judaism, and Buddhism— and restricted the activities of groups not registered in the country for at least 15 years.

Around 1980 the Central Baptist Church in Smolensk, with whom WMPC now has a twining relationship through PCUSA, was able to build a church building. Today they are able to worship freely and practice their ministry that includes support of orphanages, drug rehab facilities and many other activities throughout the year at Camp Rodnik.
