Beginnings and Endings on our Horizons

In just a few days (yes days) the main construction of our new Edinburgh Building will be complete. Once we move into the structure, we will be able to enjoy new community partnerships, new worship spaces, new dining options, and new means to celebrate and promote service in our community. While it will take a little while to find our bearings in our new spaces, I believe that we will soon begin to understand all the benefits which will come with this transformational space. So, we begin the anticipated end of this phase of the building project by thanking God for the grace that sets us free and helps us arrive at this important juncture. And we thank all those families whose generous gifts have allowed us to realize this time of blessings in the life of our church. As we look to our 75th year in 2021 we certainly have made our statement about our hopes for the future of our ministry.

Soon after we move into Edinburgh, we will begin the final phase of our work as we begin the renovations of Pickard Hall, Geneva Hall, and our aging kitchen facility. It should be completed in June. During this renovation phase we will all need to be patient once again as renovating these spaces will bring the construction closer to the heart of our facility than it has yet to have been. The results will be wonderful, but the renovation process is likely to pose many challenges.

In the life of the church year and in our theological minds, the church season of Epiphany ends with Transfiguration Sunday on February 23. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday soon after. I would personally invite each of you to attend our combined Oberlin Road Ash Wednesday service on February 26. Lent begins as Epiphany ends and it once again enters into our lives to be a time of reflection on the limits of earthly life, the reality of human sin, and the wonder of God as creator, savior, and sustainer. If you will allow it to be - Lent is among the most spiritually rich times of the Christian year.

As we live into 2020, I ask for your prayers for there truly are many beginnings and endings on our horizons. Newness brings excitement but it also brings more work, greater obligations, and unexpected adjustments. Your leaders, those on staff and those you elect, are trying our hardest to manage all the changes in our midst. We have made very good plans. But you know the saying about the "best made plans." As we find our feet in new spaces that present new opportunities for ministry, let us know what is going well, what is confusing, and what can be improved. Your honest feedback will help us iron out the wrinkles all the more quickly.



WHITE MEMORIAL PROVIDED \$47,000.00 IN GRANTS THROUGH THE COMMUNITY ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE IN 2019 TO THESE AGENCIES TO MEET THE NEED:

BOYS AND GIRLS CLUBS OF WAKE COUNTY: Located throughout Wake County the Boys and Girls Clubs offer after school programming, academic help, and sports opportunities. The centers offer an inviting and safe environment where youth can gain self esteem and learn leadership skills.

COMMUNITIES IN SCHOOLS-MAYVIEW LEARNING CENTER: After school programming and homework help is the focus of the learning centers. Located in low-income communities the centers offer a safe and caring environment for students who have access to computers and other resources. For older students, graduation coaches help them finish high school. WMPC has been the sponsor of Mayview Leaning Center in the Oberlin Road Community for almost 20 years.

COMMUNITY MUSIC SCHOOL: A community institution committed to inspiring and enriching underserved children through traditional and innovative music education opportunities of the highest caliber. Their mission is based on the belief that music education is a path to life-long learning and knowledge of self and culture. Students with limited resources are provided classes for just \$1.00 per class.

HAVEN HOUSE: Provides a variety of services to support youth experiencing homelessness or family crisis. They offer safe, stable living arrangements, individual and family counseling and case management services. A Street Outreach Program (SOP) reaches out to provide street dependent youth basic needs.

LOAVES AND FISHES: An after school program that works with children and youth throughout their school years. Providing tutoring, mentoring, and enrichment activities, LAF works closely with the school and with families to make sure the best learning opportunities are offered.

PROJECT ENLIGHTENMENT: Through this organization parents and teachers are offered free resources for every kind of teaching/emotional need a child might have. The WMPC Week-day School teachers use their services to access books, plan crafts, and develop teaching plans. They are a state model for early intervention programs.

WAKE ED PARTNERSHIP: In collaboration with Wake County Public Schools they help provide every student with excellent educational opportunities, highly effective teachers, and strong leaders. The main focus is reading proficiency to help students read on grade level through Partners Read and Wake Up and Read. They provide books to children so that they can read at home.




Discourse and discord sound similar, but they are completely different. God's spirit calls to us to practice discourse and yet words of discord bombard us on television, radio and social media.


How can we love our neighbors if we never listen to them? Seeking the common good requires both speaking the truth in love and opening our hearts and ears to others (especially when they are disagreeable).






