### Dear members and friends of White Memorial...

I SPENT A LOT OF TIME READING THIS SUMMER. I used it as a tool to beat back the waves of fear and doubt which entered every life this year. Some of this reading has been done alongside church members in book groups and with our 21-Day Racial Equity Habit Building Challenge. Some of it has

been reading about the history of recipes and the food we eat. I have read cultural commentary and columnists of many different races and political persuasions. This reading has not only given me much to think about and consider, it has settled me somewhat. I am grateful.

Early in August, *The Wall Street Journal* published a piece by the brilliant Peggy Noonan. She is such a good writer and has a unique understanding of our beautiful and complicated country. Her words are measured and treasured by readers like me. The piece is titled, "America is a Coalition of the Worried." In it, she writes:

It is the salient fact of the summer of '20, that everyone goes so quickly from "Beautiful day" to "How you doing?" to "I'm so worried." People who haven't worried in years are worried, and it's not about regular things, it's about big and essential things. It's a whole other order of anxiety. That's all this is about. How anxious everyone is, and how deep down they know they're going to be anxious for a long time.

These words have stayed with me. Put her words alongside all the quotes by the great Christians who have lived before us, the kind of quotes that remind us not to pass judgment too quickly before we have considered the burden of others, and a theme begins to emerge. The "you don't know a person until you've walked a mile in their shoes" kind of theme rises up from so much of what I have read. Peggy Noonan's words about being worried, about the long anxious haul we are on, and about the sheer size of our worry have a way of leveling the playing field. We are all burdened with anxiety. And our response should be to resist the knee-jerk blaming and anger that so many express. Our response should be the patient practice of prayer, a commitment to find purpose in loving and serving others, and a dedication to inform ourselves so when opportunities for justice and healing present themselves we are ready to act and to help others.

We write this magazine several times a year to both inform and inspire. Through our website, newsletters, weekly emails, and this magazine, we are sharing information about just how different this fall is going to be. The unprecedented spring and summer will give way to an unprecedented fall. Many things about our ministry have changed.

But not everything has changed. The Holy Spirit is still near. Christ the Lord is still our guide. And God the Creator still provides. In this issue you will read about our efforts to adapt our delivery of ministry while keeping the mission of worshiping, embracing, and serving in the manner of Christ at the center of all we do. Things will look different. But our commitment to God and neighbor remains unchanged.

Peggy Noonan is correct: there is worry at every turn. But against that we remember Jesus who often said, "do not worry," and who frequently said, "do not be afraid." This calling of Jesus remains trustworthy and true. We should be grateful for it. We should dedicate ourselves to its service, too.

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

THE REOPENING TASK GROUP ASKED THE CRUCIAL QUESTIONS OF WHEN AND HOW TO REOPEN FOR IN-PERSON WORSHIP.

### **GUIDELINES & PROTOCOLS**

- We will adhere to federal, NC and Raleigh guidelines for re-opening.
- We are in close contact with the Govenor's team and will continue to consult with city leaders and medical professionals.
- We will stay informed on current trends of the COVID-19 virus.
- We will observe social distancing protocols and congregants will be required to wear a mask upon entering church facilities.

### WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE ATTENDING SUNDAY WORSHIP

- Live streaming of worship services will continue on Sunday mornings (8:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m.).
- You will need to pre-register through Brushfire prior to worship service. (see how to register page 6)
- Within the registration process, you will be required to answer a series of health questions.
- Social distancing and masks are required on church property in all public areas and in worship (children under 5 are not required to wear masks). If you forget your mask, the church will provide you with one.
- When you register you will receive a campus map showing designated entrances and exits. We ask that you please follow.
- A one directional system for moving around campus will be in
- To start, the bathrooms between the Sanctuary and Jane Bell will be open.
- Hand sanitizers will be available throughout the church
- Entrance doors and exit doors will be propped open at the appropriate times.
- A deep clean will be done prior to and between services.

### WHAT TO EXPECT WHEN YOU ARRIVE?

- Entrances will be open 30 minutes prior to the beginning of each service.
- Signage will be placed throughout the campus reminding people of social distancing and general hygiene.

### WHAT TO EXPECT IN OUR WORSHIP SERVICES?

- Every other pew will be blocked off.
- Hymnals, Bibles and other literature have temporarily been removed.
- The pastors will dismiss the congregants by sections.
- You will not be able to exit through the door you used to enter.

### WHAT IS BRUSHFIRE AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

Brushfire is a seating reservation system designed specifically for our sanctuary, Pickard Hall, and the Main Hall in the Edinburgh Building. It will allow you to select your seat or your family group's seats and then automatically block off surrounding seats to provide for adequate social distancing. www.brushfire.com

WHAT IF I REGISTER AND DECIDE NOT TO ATTEND?

> You can and should cancel your reservation. Contact Tonya Higgins before 1:00 p.m. on the Friday before Sunday worship at thiggins@whitememorial.org.

I AM NOT QUITE READY FOR IN-PERSON WORSHIP. WILL WE CONTINUE TO OFFER STREAMING ONLINE?

> We will continue streaming worship services as we have done for years with the addition of streaming the 8:00 a.m. service and OnPoint@1704 (when it resumes).

DO I HAVE TO WEAR A MASK? WHAT IF I **FORGET MY MASK?** 

> Masks will be required for all events on campus including worship. If you forget your mask, the ushers will provide you with one.

6. WHAT STEPS IS WMPC TAKING TO ENSURE A **CLEAN, DISINFECTED CAMPUS?** 

> During the time the campus has been closed, our staff, including custodial staff, have worked to understand the best and safest practices for disinfecting the spaces used on the campus. Service times have been set so as to provide ample time for cleaning and disinfecting between services. >

### **REOPENING FAQ'S**

### HOW WILL I KNOW WHERE TO GO WHEN I ARRIVE FOR WORSHIP?

All entry to the sanctuary will be through the Narthex.

Entry to Pickard Hall will be from the courtyard. Brushfire will provide you with a ticket showing your pew and seat(s) in the designated worship space.

- WILL THERE BE AN ONPOINT SERVICE?
  We anticipate resuming OnPoint services in
  October and when they resume, streaming of
  this service should be available as well.
- WHERE DO I PARK?
  Parking will be available in all the church lots and along the streets surrounding the church.
- 10. WILL WE OFFER THE SHUTTLE?

  At the outset of in-person worship, we do not anticipate the need for shuttle service. That is one of many things we will grow into as we resume worship services on campus.
- WILL WE HAVE SUNDAY SCHOOL IN PERSON OR ONLINE?
  Sunday School will be online only at least through January 1.
- 12. WILL THE NURSERY BE AVAILABLE DURING WORSHIP?

Nursery will not be available at this time.

- CAN CHILDREN ATTEND WORSHIP? WHAT RESOURCES ARE AVAILABLE FOR THEM? Children can and are encouraged to attend worship services with their parents.
- 14. TELL ME MORE ABOUT WHAT WORSHIP DURING COVID WILL INCLUDE?

If you have been attending worship online during the past several months, you should anticipate essentially the same worship service, in the Reformed Tradition. There will be some alterations within the worship spaces in terms of how congregational singing and speaking are handled.

- 15. WHAT ABOUT BULLETINS?

  Bulletins will be placed in each seat assigned through the Brushfire system prior to the beginning of the service.
- 16. WILL THERE BE HYMNALS?
  While you will not find the "Glory to God" hardbound hymnals in the pew racks, the hymn texts will be printed in the expanded service bulletin.
- 17. SHOULD I BRING MY OWN BIBLE?
  You may always bring your own Bible, but scriptural texts will be printed in the expanded service bulletins.
- 18. WILL THERE BE A PASSING OF THE PEACE? Initially, we anticipate foregoing the Passing of the Peace, but over time we will work to find ways to reintroduce this meaningful element of worship.
- 19. WILL I HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO MAKE MY OFFERING?

We encourage you to make your offering online. We will have offering baskets at the entrance.

20. WILL COMMUNION BE SERVED?

Communion will be served at all services on the

first Sunday of each month. The elements will be pre-positioned at each seat assigned using the Brushfire system. The elements will be in pre-packaged and sealed "Friendship cups" which have been utilized for several months by the staff in the streamed services.

21. WILL I BE ABLE TO GET COFFEE IN THE CONNECTOR BEFORE WORSHIP?

Coffee stations will not be available at the start of re-opening.

22. WILL RESTROOMS BE AVAILABLE


Yes. As we first re-open restroom facilities will be open between the Sanctuary and the Jane Bell Gathering Space. Restrooms in Edinburgh and Luther Buildings will also be accessible.

### 23. WILL THE PLAYGROUNDS BE OPEN? Playgrounds are temporarily closed for non Weekday School use.

### will the church offices be open on SUNDAY?

In an effort to keep our campus as safe as possible for in-person worship during COVID only worship spaces (Sanctuary, Pickard Hall and the Main Hall in Edinburgh) will be open.


We are already planning for next year's Men's Retreat and will share details in the coming months.

hances are you've seen Karen Haneline, Web and Production Coordinator, around campus either with camera in-hand or on a tripod as she chronicles the life of White Memorial through photos and videos.

From the joy of photographing Weekday School children to recording weekly snippets, outreach partners and generosity vignettes, Karen has a talent for putting those in front of the camera at ease so they can authentically share their stories.

Karen's history with White Memorial goes back farther than her nine years on staff. For almost 35 years Karen and her husband Steve have been members of WMPC. They first started attending as they were graduating from NC State. Karen vividly recalls Dr. Pickard visiting them in their tiny college apartment. "T've often wondered what he must have thought of our tiny little place, but he made us feel so special, it didn't matter," says Karen. >

Over the years Karen and Steve have been involved in various Sunday School classes and today are active members of Theological Forum. Karen was involved with StepUp Ministry at its beginning and is currently on the board of another ministry partner, Emmaus House. She is also active with the Library Committee and was asked to manage the online catalog currently in use today.

Soon after Karen and Steve had their first child, Matthew, he was diagnosed with a mitochondrial disease and they made the choice for Karen to leave her job as a systems analyst and care for Matthew at home. Matthew lived for thirteen years. Karen and Steve also have a daughter Madeline who grew up attending youth programs at WMPC and recently graduated from Western Carolina University with a degree in construction management. She now works in Asheville, NC.

While Matthew was alive he would often attend worship with the family but occasionally became restless and Karen or Steve would take Matthew into the Jane Bell Gathering Space to listen to the service while he stretched his legs. At the time TV monitors were only pulled out for Easter and Christmas services to accommodate the overflow. Karen, knowing this, approached Gary Fulton, Associate Pastor at the time about having the monitors available for all worship services. As it happens, that was the beginning of WMPC's communications infrastructure. As Karen is so intricately involved with the audio-visual resources in the Sanctuary and around campus, there is a bit of irony that the network began with her son.

Karen has seen lots of changes since she and Steve joined the church all those years ago. At the time, Knox and Pickard were being built. And now she's chronicling the Edinburgh Building and other renovated spaces.

Karen and Steve have also seen the transition of senior pastors from Dr. Pickard to Art Ross and now Christopher Edmonston. As it happens, Christopher and Karen joined the WMPC staff at almost the same time. If you ask Christopher, he will tell you, "Karen was my first hire."

With degrees in computer science and engineering, it was a natural fit for her to support WMPCs first website redesign from its first rudimentary beginnings. That too has seen a few upgrades over the years.

Today, Karen is instrumental in working with Executive Director Andrew Amodei and Communications Coordinator Parker Gagnier in developing strategies that enable the live stream out of the sanctuary and more recently the addition of Facebook Live services, not to mention preparing for the resumption of worship in the Main Hall of the Edinburgh Building. Karen has spent countless hours in the sanctuary A/V booth recording, training, and making sure the live stream broadcast for worship every Sunday and special events goes off without a hitch. Karen always brings her best to each task, but even she has raised the bar on herself during the pandemic.

Karen is happiest anywhere near water. She and Steve love the beach and enjoy kayaking. They also keep bees and each year harvest their honey. And, in true renaissance form, Karen recently started weaving scarves and fabric on a loom Steve gifted her last Christmas.

The next time you see someone on campus with a camera, chances are it's Karen. If you do spot her, thank her for all she does to capture the ministry of White Memorial Presbyterian Church.

# One journey ends as another begins.

haron Hayes first visited WMPC in 1988 while in the area earning study credits for her master's degree at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Originally from Texas, she met her husband of over thirty years, Bill (a percussionist), while working at a music store there. After college, Sharon accepted a position with IBM as a Technical Writer, and she and Bill moved to Raleigh. Sharon came back to WMPC, bringing Bill with her. They were drawn by the music program, became members, and immediately joined the Sanctuary Choir.

Sharon saw publicity about Stephen Ministry and signed up for their first training class in the fall of 1989. That ministry allowed her to give back to others. Over the years she has served as a deacon, an elder, and she has been on various church committees and ministry teams, including Sunday School music for the 1-3 grades. She participated in WMPC's Russia partnership where she traveled to Smolensk three times and was the trip leader for two of those. In 2012 Sharon was a recipient of the Presbyterian Women's Honorary Lifetime Membership Award.

In 2001, Sharon changed careers and began a faith journey that led her to service in the nonprofit world. She joined the staff of Presbyterian Prison Ministry which serves women at the Raleigh Correctional Center for Women. She then began studying for a certification in Life Coaching and was hired by StepUp Ministry as Program Coordinator and staff coach, eventually becoming the Interim Director. Her journey continued, and after leaving StepUp she worked briefly as a coach for the staff of Loaves and Fishes Ministry.

For the past twelve years Sharon has served as Executive Director at Saint Saviour's Center. This ministry provides space for those delivering services to underserved populations in Wake County. Under her leadership, Saint Saviour's launched The Diaper Train. This program was initiated by those in our community who saw a huge need to provide baby diapers for working families who struggle to make ends meet. The Diaper Train will celebrate its 10th anniversary this year. To date, over four million diapers have been distributed.

Saint Saviour's also has healthy living programs for seniors in the Raleigh Housing Authority locations at Glenwood Towers and Carriage House, which originated with support from WMPC. Other organizations housed at the Center include Wake Relief food pantry, Meals on Wheels (on-site meal program), and Haitian Evangelical Community Church.

Sharon is now working part-time at Saint Saviour's as she prepares for retirement at the end of 2020. When asked about her plans for retirement Sharon replied, "I want to spend more time with family and work on my family tree." She has already begun her family research and discovered how her family migrated from the east coast to Texas over generations. Traveling is also on her list of things she wants to do. Sharon leaves a strong legacy at Saint Saviour's, and its success is due to her diligence and hard work.

PERHAPS THE MOST FAMOUS VERSE IN ALL THE BIBLE IS JOHN 3:16: "FOR GOD SO LOVED THE WORLD THAT GOD GAVE HIS ONLY SON...." IF WE LOOK AT THE VERBS WE SEE TWO OF THE MOST POWERFUL VERBS WE HAVE: LOVE AND GIVE. THE VERY NATURE OF GOD IS TO LOVE AND TO GIVE. MOST OF THE LESSONS OF JESUS ARE ABOUT LOVING AND GIVING. THE HOLY SPIRIT CONTINUES TO GUIDE THE CHURCH AND ITS MEMBERS AND FRIENDS TO CONTINUE IN THE PRACTICE OF LOVING AND GIVING.

The core of generosity is found where loving and giving intersect. Generosity to the church, to neighbors, to those near to us and far from us is one of the defining marks of our discipleship. While it is true that generosity to a church is essential for funding the ministries which define our witness, it is equally true that generosity is a personal practice shared through community that mirrors our commitment to God and our concern for one another. The practice of generosity is among the most important things we do because it is reflective of the loving and giving heart of God.

This fall we will be focusing our generosity efforts around the central idea that generosity is a practice for our heads, hearts, and hands. How does being generous shape our thinking? How does it direct our love? How does it define our work and witness in our community and the world? One thinks of the Prayer of St. Patrick who prayed, "God be in my head....God be in my heart.... God be in my hands." Generosity is not just for one aspect of our identity: it is for our whole selves and lives.

THE CORE OF GENEROSITY IS FOUND WHERE LOVING AND GIVING INTERSECT.

We hope you will join us as we read through beautiful verses of Isaiah alongside texts from Epistles and the Gospels. We hope you'll find in the words of the prophet the kind of inspiration we all need to learn how to share fairly and freely. It is the generous gifts of the whole of the body of Christ that allow for the witness of the church in the world. When we share our money, our prayer, our time, and our care for one another we are making a tangible witness to the grace of Jesus Christ and its power to support the body of Christ in its work and mission. When we say we cannot do our work without you, we are telling a truth. A truth as vital as the one that reminds us that loving and giving are the measurements by which we take stock of spiritual health itself.

reasoned into. Yes, of course, we can find arguments to support our faith, but normally faith comes first, followed by a lifetime of mentally organizing the reasons that strengthen it. Faith is reasonable, so to speak, but it is more than an opinion about God, Christ and holy things. As such, faith is a response to a whole complex of experiences, some involving reasoning, others coming to us in subtle ways for which there may be no unambiguous explanation. To speak about it at all requires a variety of imaginative uses of language that exhibit the same kind of truthful subtlety as a painting does — or a hymn, a poem, or a carefully crafted story.

Worship has never been intended to be either a classroom or a concert hall. The Bible is not a textbook. Liturgical language is not the language of engineering or journalism. Worship is meant to be a meeting place. It is a place of "presence." I am not talking about emotion, necessarily, nor excluding it

Those who know at least a little about church talk know that "presence" is likely to be the sort of language expected when we talk about the sacraments But preaching is also about presence. Preaching is not just lecturing on a religious or ethical subject, not exhorting, not motivational speaking, not explaining the historical context of 2 Kings or 2 Corinthians. Those things will happen, but they play only a supporting role in a unique kind of speech The intention of this speech is to lead us to a state of attentiveness to the God who offers us a place of meeting in and through language carefully used.

The starting place for preaching is the language of the Bible. Biblical language has human fingerprints all over it. One can see it as a piece of art, even a kind of "graphic" art constructed out of ordinary words. It draws attention to the God who is able to be present to us in, through and in spite of the limitations of human speech. Sometimes, it uses indirection as the most direct means to create a meeting place. It invites us to

be present to God, Christ, Spirit. self in the original and
